The African American Library and Information Science Association (AALISA), based at UCLA and the California Institute of Pan African Studies, will publish the *Journal of Pan African Studies*, a new peer-reviewed interdisciplinary, international, electronic journal of African culture and consciousness. The journal will be published four times a year and will contain original, scholarly articles, book reviews, poetry, interviews, news, announcements, and bibliographic information related to the study and research of the Pan African experience. Manuscripts submitted to the journal should follow MLA style, not exceeding 20 double-spaced typed pages, with relevant author information and a 50-word abstract.
