ware will permit institutions without sophisticated preservation expertise to develop realistic preservation plans based on local needs and resources. Barclay Ogden, head of the Conservation Department at the University of California at Berkeley, will act as project consultant and Martha Hanson, head of the Conservation Department at Syracuse University, will provide additional expertise.

The ten participating institutions represent various types of libraries or archives and the survey results are expected to provide valuable data on the preservation needs of central New York.
