Deaths

Joseph C. Andrews, 62, head of collection management at the University of Central Florida (UCF) Library, died June 24. Andrews began his library career at the St. Paul's College library in 1971. He moved to Virginia Commonwealth University in 1979, where he served in a variety of positions, including reference librarian, music librarian, acting head of reference, and head of the circulation and reserve department. Andrews began working in the UCF Library as a reference librarian in 1988. In 1989, he became head of the acquisitions department, and in October 1999 assumed the responsibility of head of the new collection management department. Andrews was a staunch supporter of the diversity initiative movement and was involved in several ALA divisions, including ACRL, Association for Library Collections and Technical Services, Library Administration and Management Association/Library Organization and Management Section, Library and Information Technology Association, Reference User Services Association (formerly RASD), and ALA's Black Caucus.

Francis (Jim) Flood died on May 11. Flood was on the faculty of the library and information science program at the University of Missouri -Columbia (UMC) from 1951 until his re-

tirement in 1990. He served terms as chair of the Department of Library Science and as acting dean of the school during that time. He returned to the faculty after his retirement to serve several more years, including a second term as chair of the department of library science.

Flood was instrumental in securing ALA accreditation for UMC's master's program in 1969.

Edith Baker Hampel, 85, who retired from Temple University Libraries in February 2000,

died of cancer on June 16. She had a 60-year career as a librarian, the last 30 of which were spent at Temple's Paley Library, where she served at one time as head of the reference department. She also served for more than ten years as a member of the executive committee of the Temple Association of University Professionals. Early in her career, Hampel worked at the University of Pennsylvania Libraries and at Times Inc.'s Editorial Research Library in New York.

A. Dean Larsen, retired associate university librarian at Brigham Young University (BYU), died on May 20, after a long battle with cancer. He was employed by the BYU Library for 40 years, retiring in 1995, and was principally responsible for the acquisition of more than 3-million volumes during his career, adding not only to the general collection, but building a world-class special collections, as well. Prior to his death, Larsen and his wife, Jean, donated their personal collection of more than 1,800 books, pamphlets, maps, photographs, and postcards dealing with Yellowstone National Park to BYU and established an endowment for its continued growth.

Rosemary Little, Princeton University's Politics, Public Administration and Law librarian, died on December 23, 2001. She began her career at Princeton as a reference librarian in 1961 and, throughout her long career, contributed to the profession with her diligent and visible work on various ALA and Special Libraries Association committees and subgroups.
