PROFILE

RICHARD HUME WERKING has been appointed director of libraries and associate professor of history at Trinity University, San Antonio, Texas, effec-

tive June 1. Werking has been associate director for collection development at Trinity since July 1981. He will succeed Robert Houze, who is retiring after 18 years as head librarian.

Before coming to Trinity, Werking served as acting director of libraries at the University of Mississippi. He was also head of reference at Mississippi from 1977 to 1979 and assistant direc-

tor for reference and collection development services from 1979 to 1980. While there Werking organized and served as co-chair of the Mississippi Association of College and Research Libraries, an ACRL chapter.

From 1975 to 1977 Werking was reference librarian and university archivist at Lawrence University, Appleton, Wisconsin, where he served as secretary-treasurer of the Wisconsin Association of Academic Libraries. In the 1960s he taught history at Northland College, Wisconsin, and spent a year as personnel staffing specialist for the U.S. Civil Service Commission in Indianapolis.

Werking earned a Ph.D. in history from the University of Wisconsin in 1973. In 1975, as a postdoctoral fellow in a special program sponsored by the Council on Library Resources, he received a master's in librarianship from the University of Chicago. He also holds a bachelor's degree in history from the University of Evansville and a master's degree in U.S. history from the University of Wisconsin.

Active within ALA and ACRL, Werking served as chair of ACRL's Continuing Education Committee in 1977–79. He is currently a member of the RTSD Resources Section's Library Materials Price Index Committee.

The author of many articles in such journals as Business History Review, Administrative Science Quarterly, College & Research Libraries, and Li-

brary Trends, Werking has also written a book, The Master Architects: Building the United States Foreign Service, 1890-1913, which placed second in the Frederick Turner Prize competition for best book on American history in 1977.

•EBSCO Subscription Services is now cooperating with the Washington Library Network for EBSCO customers on the West Coast to send their orders for serial publications electronically using WLN's acquisitions subsystem. Upon receipt at WLN, the orders are stored in a data collection facility until the are re-routed to WLN's vendor files. EBSCO regional offices in San Francisco and Los Angeles then use a dial-up terminal to pull orders from their respective files. Contact: EBSCO Subscription Services, P.O. • The Institute for Scientific Information has designed a microcomputer software package specifically designed to manage scientists' and librarians' reprint collections. The Sci-Mate Personal Data Manager turns the user's reprint file into a mini-database. Users can enter bibliographic information about each paper, book, pamphlet, letter, lab note, or other items. They can then use Sci-Mate to search and identify items that match search terms or phrases they select. The system uses Boolean logic and has truncation capability. The user simply enters bibliographic information on the keyboard. No pre-indexing is required, and the system can accomodate information of practically any length. Users can label up to 20 different fields (author, title, journal, date, etc.) for each entry, and there is room for notes or comments.

Besides the microcomputer keyboard, information can also be entered into Sci-Mate through a word processor. Users of ISI's sister system, the Sci-Mate Universal Online Searcher, can search online databases and capture the information in the Personal Data Manager. The Sci-Mate Personal Data Manager is available for \$540. The Universal Online Searcher is available for \$440. They may be purchased together at a cost of \$880.

Sci-Mate operates on the Vector 3 or 4, the IBM Personal Computer, the Apple II, the TRS-80 Model II, or any CP/M-80 system with a standard 8-inch drive. The user also needs a printer and, for the Universal Online Searcher, a modem. ISI recommends at least 500 kilobytes of disk storage.
