National digital strategy

In December 2000, the U.S. Congress appropriated funds for the Library of Congress (LC) to work with other federal, scholarly, and non-profit organizations to develop a national strategy for the preservation of digital information. LC commissioned the Council on Library and Information Resources (CLIR) to prepare background papers; conduct interviews with individuals in the technology, business, entertainment, academic, legal, archival and library communities; and prepare a report summarizing the results. CLIR and LC have now published the summary report and background papers as *Building a national strategy for digital preservation: issues in digital media archiving.*

Emergency rueda

The Heritage Emergency National Task Force has released *Rueda de salvamento y respuesta ante emergencias*, the Spanish-language version of its Emergency Response and Salvage Wheel. These round sliding-window charts provide easy-to-use information for dealing with emergencies that threaten cultural collections. Side 1 of the wheel is devoted to emergency response, and side 2 is devoted to salvage. Each wheel comes in a resealable plastic bag with instructions in Spanish and English.

Heritage Preservation will distribute 15,000 wheels free-of-charge to libraries, archives, and cultural institutions in Puerto Rico and parts of the U.S. with large Spanish-speaking populations. may be purchased by nonprofit organizations and government agencies for \$6.95 each, or by other types of organizations for \$10.95.
