two-story addition designed by Ford, Powell & Carson, Inc., of San Antonio. The theatre arts library, another Tobin gift, places a special emphasis on theatre construction and stage design. Before

it enters the McNay, the collection will form the basis for a large exhibition to open at the Grolier Club in New York in September.
