Thefts of Books and MSS

An Ad Hoc Committee on Security established by the Rare Books and Manuscripts Section (RBMS) is now compiling information about recent thefts of valuable books and manuscripts from libraries, archives, and booksellers.

The committee will also explore existing procedures for theft alert and recovery and work toward the development of guidelines for libraries and antiquarian bookselling firms.

Terry Belanger (assistant dean, School of Library Service, Columbia University, New York, NY 10027) asks persons with recent experience of a theft (or attempted theft) to send him any published or other available information about the theft. All information provided will be kept confidential.
