The Atlas of Sacred Places: Meeting Points of Heaven and Earth, by James Harpur (240 pages, 1994), describes 33 temples, ancient burial places, pilgrimage sites, monuments, and landscapes considered sacred by different cultures past and present. This is not an in-depth study, but the excellent photographs do convey a sense of the extraordinariness of each sacred site. Some unusual lo-

Biological Anomalies: Humans III, compiled by William R. Corliss (206 pages, October 1994), is a catalog of anthropological data and observations that cannot be explained readily by prevailing scientific theories. Part three of a projected series of ten, this volume covers anomalies in the hominid fossil record (abrupt changes in hominid morphol-



ogy, the sudden demise of the Neanderthals, giant hominid skeletons); human genetics (human and ape chromosome numbers differ, human mitochondria radically different from those of other organisms); unrecognized hominids (bigfoot/ sasquatch or Chinese wildmen); and human interface phenomena (unusual animal attacks on humans, manipulation of human behavior by viruses, the inverse

Surprisingly for this conservative era, incidents have declined in the latter half of the 1980s after starting out with a high of 365 cases in 1981, Reagan's first year in office. 


