J. Morris Jones Award Goes to ALA Divisions

Nine divisions of the American Library Association, including ACRL, have received the 1983 J. Morris Jones Award. Sponsored by World Book Encyclopedia, the Jones Award consists of a grant of \$5,000 for programs that will implement the goal and objectives of ALA.

The ALA divisions will use the grant money for a cooperative project to strengthen the leadership skills of divisional officers both in their roles in ALA and their respective units. The project, entitled "ALA Divisional Leadership Enhancement Program," will include a one-time preconference for all divisional leaders, followed by an annual leadership orientation for newly elected divisional officers and board members. A training package which can be used within divisions to develop leadership below the board level will also be developed.

ACRL will administer the project, and Barbara Macikas will coordinate the project at ACRL Headquarters.
