

In honor of his services to the University of Northern Iowa, the State Board of Regents has named the library building the Donald O. Rod Library.

Death

FRED CARRINGTON COLE, president of the Council on Library Resources from 1967 to 1977 and a member of its board of directors since 1962, died on May 6 at his home in Chapel Hill, North Carolina.
