Preservation planning guide

The American Association of Museums (AAM) and the Northeast Document Conservation Center (NEDCC) have jointly published *Preservation Planning: Guidelines for Writing a Long Range Plan*. Written by Sherelyn Ogden, well-known book conservator, this loseleaf workbook details the process of writing a preservation plan once a collections needs assessment has been completed. It is suitable for use by libraries, archives, historical societies, as well as museums. It contains worksheets, a checklist for the process, a sample plan, and information on updating and marketing. The worksheets also come on an IBM-compatible disc.
