in its twenty-five pages. Citations come from the ERIC collection and other sources.

The third paper, Acronyms and Initialisms of Library Networks, is the second edition of an annotated listing of library networks across the nation, which includes references to further information on each network where possible. A feedback form for future editions is included.

All three of these publications are being made available from Box E for \$5.00. Individually, the *Acronyms* and *Bibliography* cost \$1.50 each, and the *Computerized Networks* costs \$3.00. Checks made payable to "Box E" must be included with orders and sent to: Box E, School of Education, Stanford University, Stanford, CA 94305. Purchase orders cannot be accepted. A discount of 15 percent is available for orders of over ten copies of any publication. micrographics equipment review

Micrographics Equipment Review has been developed to provide the decision maker with all of the information needed for intelligent micrographics equipment purchasing decisions. For the first time, a steady flow of critical reviews of equipment manufactured in the United States and around the world is available to the user community, whether librarian, purchasing agent, or other responsible equipment selector. The editor and primary reviewer for **Micrographics Equipment Review** is William R. Hawken. Mr. Hawken has for many years been a micrographics consultant to **Library Technology Reports**, a service publication of the American Library Association.

Reviews will range from hand-held viewers to the most elaborate reader-printers. Emphasis will also be placed on equipment designed for COM microforms. In general reviews will exclude equipment for engineering drawings applications. Subscribers however, may request reviews of certain types of equipment.

Micrographics Equipment Review is offered as a yearly subscription. Printed reviews (designed to fit an accompanying three-ring binder) are sent quarterly—January, April, July and October (for 1976 only, subscribers will receive reviews on June 1 and December 1).

Subscribers also receive an annual five-part index. Access points include manufacturer's name, model name and/or number, year of introduction, price range, and function.
