# Some fixed point results in fuzzy metric space using intimate mappings 

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#### Abstract

The aim of this research paper is to prove the existence and uniqueness of common fixed point theorems for four self-mappings in fuzzy metric space using the notion of Intimate mappings.We also provide appropriate illustrations to justify the key points mentioned in the main results.

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## 1. Introduction

L.A Zadeh [1] initiated the new concept, as extension an of classical set namely Fuzzy set. Lateron the notion of fuzzy metric space was introduced by Kramosil and Mechalek in [2]. Further this was altered by George and veeramani [4] in order to obtain Harsdorff topology for the class of fuzzy metric spaces. Thereafter many fixed point theorems came into light under various conditions like ([5],[6],[9],[10],[11],[13],[16],[19]) in fuzzy metric space.

Under other conditions, Sahu and others [12] developed the notion of generalized compatible mappings of type $(\mathcal{A})$ called Intimate mappings. These were further extended by Chugh and Madhu Aggarwal [13] which resulted in the formation of some results in Hausdorff uniform spaces. Further some more results can be witnessed like [14] using intimate mappings in complex valued metric space. Apart from this Praveenkumar and others [15] proved some theorems in multiplicative metric space (MMS) using the notion of intimate mappings and subsequently many results came into existence on this platform like ([17],[18]).

The concept of non-compatible mappings extended as the E. A property was introduced in metric space by Aamri and Matouwakil [20]. Consequently, the concept of improved E.A property resulted in the formation of common property E.A was introduced by Yicheng liu et al. [21].

The important note of this artice is to extend the notion of intimate mappings in fuzzy metric space using recent concepts like the different forms of E.A properties.In this process we prove three unique common fixed point theorems using these concepts. Cocequently these results stand as generalizations of some of the existing results like [16] [19]. Furthermore, some illustrations are provided to support our findings.

## 2. Definitions and Preliminaries

Definition 2.1 (B.Schweizer and A.Sklar [7]):A binary operation $*:[0,1] \times[0,1] \rightarrow[0,1]$ is said to be continuous triangular norm (i. e continuous $t$-norm) if the following assertions hold: (CT-i) * is continuous;(CT-ii) $a * b \leq \mathrm{c} * d$ where $a \leq b, c \leq d$ and $a, b, c, d \in[0,1] ;(C T-i i i) a * 1=a$ for $a \in[0,1]$; (CT-iv) $*$ is associative and commutative.
Definition 2.2 (Kramosil and Mechalek [2]): A triplet ( $\mathbb{X}, M_{K M},{ }^{*}$ ) is fuzzy metric space (i.e., FMS) if $\mathbb{X}$ is a arbitrary set, ${ }^{*}$ is continuous $t$ - norm and $M_{K M}$ is fuzzy set on $\mathbb{X}^{2} \times(0, \infty)$ satisfying the following conditions for all $x, y, z \in \mathbb{X}$ such that $t, s \in(0, \infty)$ :
(KMFM-i) $\quad \mathrm{M}_{\text {KM }}(x, y, 0)=0$
(KMFM-ii) $\mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{Kм}}(x, y, t)=1 \quad \forall t>0 \Leftrightarrow x=y$

Example 2.3 (George \&Veeramani [4]): Consider $\left(\mathbb{X}, d_{u}\right)$ is a metric space and define
$M_{K M}(x, y, t)=\frac{t}{t+d_{u}(x, y)}$ then $\left(\mathbb{X}, \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}, *\right)$ is FMS where $\forall x, y \in \mathbb{X}, t>0$
and $*$ is continuous $t$-norm with $a * b=\min \{a, b\}$.

In the entire paper, $\left(\mathbb{X}, M_{K M}, *\right)$ is to be assumed FMS with the condition
(KFFM-6) : $\lim _{t \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{\text {KM }}(x, y, t)=1$ for all $x, y, \in \mathbb{X}$.
Definition 2.4 (Grabiec [3]): Let $\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle$ be sequence in FMS ( $\left.\mathbb{X}, \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}, *\right),\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle$ then converges to a point $\ell \in \mathbb{X}$ if $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{\text {KM }}\left(x_{n}, \ell, t\right)=1, \forall t>0$.
Definition 2.5 (Garbaic [3]): Let $\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle$ be a sequence in FMS ( $\mathbb{X}, \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}, *$ ), this sequence $\left.<x_{n}\right\rangle$ in $\mathbb{X}$ is said to be Cauchy sequence in FMS if $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(x_{n+p}, x_{n}, t\right)=1$, $\forall t>0$ and $p>0$.
Definition 2.6 (Garbiec [3]): If every Cauchy sequence is convergent in ( $\left.\mathbb{X}, \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}, *\right)$ then we say that it is complete.
Lemma 2.7 (S.N. Mishra et al [5]): $\operatorname{Let}\left(\mathbb{X}, \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}, *\right)$ be a FMS if there exists $k \in(0,1)$ such that $\mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}(x, y, k t) \geq \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}(x, y, t)$ then $x=y$.
Definition 2.8 ([5],[10]): Let $\mathfrak{S}$ and $\mathfrak{I}$ be two self mappings of a $\operatorname{FMS}\left(\mathbb{X}, \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}, *\right)$.
Then $\mathfrak{S}$ and $\mathfrak{I}$ are
(1) compatible if $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{S T} x_{n}, \mathfrak{T} \mathfrak{S} x_{n}, t\right)=1$ whenever a sequence $\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle$ in $\mathbb{X}$ provided $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{G} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{T} x_{n}=t$ for some $t \in \mathbb{X}$
(2) compatible of type $(\mathcal{A})$ if
$\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{S T} x_{n}, \mathfrak{T} x_{n}, t\right)=1 \lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{T} \mathfrak{S} x_{n}, \mathfrak{S} \mathfrak{S} x_{n}, t\right)=1$ whenever $\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle$ in $\mathbb{X}$ such that $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{S} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{I} x_{n}=t$ for some $t \in \mathbb{X}$.
Now we discuss some definitions related to intimate mappings in FMS.
Definition 2.9: Let $\mathfrak{A}$ and $\mathfrak{S}$ be two mappings of a $\operatorname{FMS}\left(\mathbb{X}, \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}, *\right)$ into itself. Then $\mathfrak{A}$ and $\mathfrak{S}$ are said to be
(1). $\mathcal{A}$-Intimate mappings if $\alpha \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(\mathfrak{H} \subseteq x_{n}, \mathfrak{A} x_{n}, t\right) \geq \alpha \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(\mathfrak{S} \subseteq x_{n}, \mathfrak{S} x_{n}, t\right)$ where $\alpha=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty}$ Sup or $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \operatorname{Inf}$ and $\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle$ is a sequence in $\mathbb{X} \ni \lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \subseteq \mathbb{S} x_{n}=t$ for some $t \in \mathbb{X}$.
(2). $\mathcal{S}$-Intimate mapping if $\alpha \mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{S}\left\{x_{n}, \mathfrak{S} x_{n}, t\right) \geq \alpha \mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{H} \mathfrak{A} x_{n}, \mathfrak{H} x_{n}, t\right)\right.$ where $\alpha=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty}$ Sup or $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \operatorname{Inf}$ and a sequence $\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle$ in $\mathbb{X} \ni \lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{S} x_{n}=t$ for some $t \in \mathbb{X}$.
Proposition 2.10: Let $\mathfrak{A}$ and $\mathfrak{S}$ be two self mappings of a FMS ( $\left.\mathbb{X}, M_{K M}, *\right)$. Suppose $\mathfrak{A}$ and $\mathfrak{S}$ are compatible mappings of type $(\mathcal{A})$ then the pair of mappings $\mathfrak{A}$ and $\mathfrak{S}$ are $\mathcal{A}$ - intimate mappings and $\mathcal{S}$-intimate mappings.
Proof:Since $\mathfrak{A}$ and Sare compatible of type $(\mathcal{A})$, we have $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{H} x_{n}, \mathfrak{S} x_{n}, t\right)=1$ and $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{S} \mathfrak{A} x_{n}, \mathfrak{A} \mathfrak{A}\left(x_{n}, t\right)=1\right.$ whenever $\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle$ in $\mathbb{X} \ni \lim _{\mathrm{n} \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{S} x_{n}=t$ for some $t \in \mathbb{X}$.

By taking $k_{1}=1-\beta$ and $0<k_{1}<1$ and letting $n \rightarrow \infty$ and $\beta \rightarrow 1$ we obtain

By applying limit supremum on both sides, $\alpha \mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{H} \subseteq x_{n}, \mathfrak{U} x_{n}, t\right) \geq \alpha \mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{S} x_{n}, \mathfrak{U} x_{n}, t\right)$ this implies $\mathfrak{\mathscr { A }}$ and $\mathfrak{S}$ are $\mathcal{A}$-intimate mappings whenever $\left\{x_{n}\right\}$ is a sequence in $\mathbb{X}$ such that $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{S} x_{n}=t$ for some $t \in \mathbb{X}$. Likewise, we can prove that the pair of these mappings is $\mathcal{S}$-intimate.
Proposition 2.11: Let $\mathfrak{A}$ and $\mathfrak{S}$ be two self mappings on FMS. $\mathfrak{A}$ and $\mathfrak{S}$ are $\mathcal{A}$-intimate mappings and $\mathfrak{A r} \mathrm{t}_{1}=\mathfrak{S t}_{1}=p, p \in \mathbb{X}$ then $\mathrm{M}_{K M}(\mathfrak{A} \mathrm{p}, \mathrm{p}, t) \geq \mathrm{M}_{K M}(\mathfrak{S p}, \mathrm{p}, t)$.
Proof: Suppose that $\left\{x_{n}\right\} \in \mathbb{X}$ is a sequence such that $\mathfrak{A} \mathrm{x}_{\mathrm{n}}=\mathfrak{S}_{\mathrm{n}} \rightarrow \mathfrak{A} \mathrm{t}_{1}=\mathfrak{S t}_{1}=p$ for some $p, t \in \mathbb{X}$.
Since the pair of mappings $\mathfrak{A}$ and $\subseteq$ are $\mathcal{A}$ - intimate, then we obtain

Thus $\mathrm{M}_{K M}(\mathfrak{Z p}, \mathrm{p}, t) \geq \mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{S}_{\mathrm{p}}, \mathrm{p}, t\right)$.
Remark 2.12: A pair of mappings $\mathfrak{A}$ and $\subseteq$ is $\mathcal{A}$-intimate or $\mathcal{S}$-intimate but not compatible mapping of type $(\mathcal{A})$.

The following example revels the relation between intimate mappings and compatible mappings of type ( $\mathcal{A}$ ).
Example 2.13: Suppose $\mathbb{X}=[0,1]$. Define two self-mappings $\mathfrak{A}$ and $\mathfrak{S}$ as follows $\mathfrak{U}(x)=\frac{5}{x+5} \mathfrak{S}(x)=\frac{1}{x+1}$ for every $x$ in $[0,1]$.
Consider a sequence $\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle=\frac{1}{n} n \in \mathbb{N}$.Then $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{U} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} x_{n}=1$.
Consequently, $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} M\left(\mathfrak{H} \subseteq x_{n}, \mathfrak{A} x_{n}, t\right)=\frac{6 t}{6 t+1}$ and $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} M\left(\subseteq \subseteq x_{n}, \subseteq x_{n}, t\right)=\frac{2 t}{2 t+1}$.
Hence $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} M_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{H} \subseteq x_{n}, \mathfrak{A}\left(x_{n}, t\right) \geq \lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} M_{K M}\left(\subseteq \subseteq x_{n}, \mathfrak{S} x_{n}, t\right)\right.$, for all $t>0$.
Thus, the pair $(\mathfrak{A}, \mathfrak{S})$ is $\mathcal{A}$-intimate.
On the other hand, the $(\mathfrak{A}, \mathfrak{S})$ are not compatible of type $(\mathcal{A})$,since $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{H S} x_{n}, \mathfrak{S} x_{n}, t\right)=\frac{3 t}{3 t+1} \neq 1$ and $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{S} \mathfrak{U} x_{n}, \mathfrak{H} \mathfrak{H} x_{n}, t\right)=\frac{3 t}{3 t+1} \neq 1$.
Definition 2.14[20]: Define $\mathfrak{A}$ and $\mathfrak{S}$ as two self maps of FMS ( $\left.\mathbb{X}, M_{K M}, *\right)$ then we say that $\mathfrak{A}$ and $\mathfrak{S}$ satisfy the property E.A if there exists a sequence $\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle \in \mathbb{X}$ such that $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{S} x_{n}=t$ for some $t \in \mathbb{X}$.
Definition 2.15[21]: Suppose $\mathfrak{A}, \mathfrak{B}, \mathfrak{B}$ and $\mathfrak{I}$ are four self maps on FMS ( $\left.\mathbb{X}, \mathrm{M}_{\text {KM }}, *\right)$ then we say that $(\mathfrak{A}, \mathfrak{P})$ and $(\mathfrak{B}, \mathfrak{T})$ satisfy common property E.A whenever two sequences $\left\langle\mathrm{x}_{n}\right\rangle$ and $\left\langle\gamma_{n}\right\rangle$ in $\mathbb{X}$ satisfying
$\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{S} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{B} \gamma_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{I} \gamma_{n}=t$ for some $t \in \mathbb{X}$.

## 3. Main results

3.1 Theorem: Let $\left(\mathbb{X}, \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}, *\right)$ be a complete fuzzy metric space. Suppose $\mathfrak{P}, \mathfrak{Q}, \mathfrak{S}$ and $\mathfrak{A}$ are self maps on $\mathbb{X}$ satisfying the conditions
$(\mathcal{C}-1) \mathfrak{P}(\mathbb{X}) \subseteq \mathfrak{S}(\mathbb{X})$ and $\mathfrak{Q}(\mathbb{X}) \subseteq \mathfrak{A}(\mathbb{X})$

where $k \in(0,1)$ and for all $x, \gamma \in \mathbb{X}$
$(\mathcal{C}-3) \mathfrak{A}(\mathbb{X})$ is complete
$(\mathcal{C}-4)$ the pair of mappings $\mathfrak{X}$ and $\mathfrak{B}$ is $\mathcal{A}$ - intimate and the other pair of mappings also $\mathfrak{S}$ and $\mathfrak{Q}$ is $\mathcal{S}$ - intimate.
Then $\mathfrak{P}, \mathfrak{Q}, \mathfrak{S}$ and $\mathfrak{A}$ have a unique common fixed point in $\mathbb{X}$.

## Proof:

Let $x_{0}$ be any arbitrary point of $\mathbb{X}$.
Since from the condition $\mathfrak{P}(\mathbb{X}) \subseteq \subseteq(\mathbb{X})$ of $(\mathcal{C}-1)$, there exists a point $x_{1} \in \mathbb{X}$ such that $\mathfrak{P} x_{0}=\mathfrak{S} x_{1}=\gamma_{0}$.
Now for this $x_{1}$ and applying the $(\mathcal{C}-1)[i . e ~ \mathfrak{Q}(\mathbb{X}) \subseteq \mathfrak{A}(\mathbb{X})] \exists x_{2} \in \mathbb{X}$ such that $\mathfrak{Q} x_{1}=\mathfrak{U} x_{2}=\gamma_{1}$.
Inductively, we establish two real sequences $\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle$ and $<\gamma_{n}>$ in $\mathbb{X} \ni \gamma_{2 n}=\mathfrak{P} x_{2 n}=$ $\mathfrak{S} x_{2 n+1}$ and $\gamma_{2 n+1}=\mathfrak{Q} x_{2 n+1}=\mathfrak{U} x_{2 n+2}$ for $n \geq 0$.
By taking $x=x_{2 n}, \gamma=x_{2 n+1}$ in the inequality $(\mathcal{C}-2)$,

$\mathfrak{P}(\mathbb{X})=\mathfrak{Q}(\mathbb{X})=[0.125,0.25]$ and $\mathfrak{A}(\mathbb{X})=\mathfrak{S}(\mathbb{X})=[0,0.25]$ these sets satisfy the condition $(\mathcal{C}-1)$.
Now assume $\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle=\left\{0.125+\frac{1}{n}\right\}$ then $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{P} x_{n}=0.25$.
Also we have, $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A P} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A} \mathfrak{P}\left(0.125+\frac{1}{n}\right)=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A}(0.25)=0.125$.
$\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(\mathfrak{H P} x_{n}, \mathfrak{A} x_{n}, t\right) \geq \lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(\mathfrak{P} \Re x_{n}, \mathfrak{P} x_{n}, t\right)$, for $t>0$.
Thus, the pair $(\mathfrak{U}, \mathfrak{P})$ is $\mathcal{A}$-intimate.
Further $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(\mathfrak{S Q} x_{n}, \mathfrak{S} x_{n}, t\right) \geq \lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(\mathfrak{Q Q} x_{n}, \mathfrak{Q} x_{n}, t\right)$.
Thus, the pair $(\mathbb{S}, \mathfrak{Q})$ is $\mathcal{S}$-intimate.
Moreover, it satisfies the contraction condition of the theorem. Clearly 0.25 is the unique common fixed point for these four mappings.

Theorem.3.2: Let $\left(\mathbb{X}, \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}, *\right)$ be a fuzzy metric space. Suppose $\mathfrak{P}, \mathfrak{Q}, \mathfrak{S}$ and $\mathfrak{A}$ are self maps on $\mathbb{X}$ satisfies the conditions $(\mathcal{C}-1),(\mathcal{C}-2),(\mathcal{C}-3)$ and $(\mathcal{C}-4)$ with $(\mathcal{C}-5):(\mathfrak{P}, \mathfrak{A})$ or $(\mathfrak{Q}, \mathfrak{S})$ satisfy E.A property
then $\mathfrak{P}, \mathfrak{Q}, \mathfrak{S}$ and $\mathfrak{A}$ have a unique common fixed point in $\mathbb{X}$.
Proof: Suppose the pair $(\mathfrak{Q}, \mathfrak{S})$ satisfies E.A property then $\exists$ sequence $\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle$ in $\mathbb{X}$ such that $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{Q} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{S} x_{n}=p *$ for some $p * \in \mathbb{X}$.
Since $\mathfrak{Q}(\mathbb{X}) \subseteq \mathfrak{A}(\mathbb{X})$ then $\exists\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle$ in $\mathbb{X}$ such that $\mathfrak{Q} x_{n}=\mathfrak{A} y_{n}$.
Hence $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A} \gamma_{n}=\mathrm{p} * \ldots . .(\varphi-1)$.
Now we show that $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{P} \gamma_{n}=p *$.
Put $x=\gamma_{n}$ and $\gamma=x_{n}$ we obtain,

Using $(\varphi-7)(\varphi-8)$ and we conclude that $\mathfrak{A} p *=\mathfrak{P} p *=\mathfrak{Q} p *=\mathfrak{S} p *=p *$.
We can prove the uniqueness of the common fixed point easily.
Example 3.2.1: Suppose ( $\left.\mathbb{X}, \mathrm{M}_{\text {KM }}, *\right)$ is a standard $\operatorname{FMS}$ with $a * a \geq a \forall a \in[1,11)$, where $\mathfrak{A}, \mathfrak{S}, \mathfrak{P}$ and $\mathfrak{Q}: \mathbb{X} \rightarrow \mathbb{X}$ as

$\mathfrak{P}(\mathbb{X})=\mathfrak{Q}(\mathbb{X})=\{1\} \cup(2,4]$ and $\mathfrak{S}(\mathbb{X})=\{1\} \cup\{6\} \cup(1,9) \mathfrak{A}(\mathbb{X})=\{1\} \cup\{4\} \cup$ $(1,4)=[1,4]$ these sets satisfy the conditions $(\mathcal{C}-2)$ and $(\mathcal{C}-3)$.
Now assume $\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle=\left\{3+\frac{1}{n}\right\}$ then $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{P} x_{n}=1$ and this implies $(\mathfrak{P}, \mathfrak{A})$ satisfies E.A property and also we have, $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A} \mathfrak{P} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{P} \mathfrak{P} x_{n}=1$. This gives
$\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{\text {KM }}\left(\mathfrak{A} \mathfrak{P} x_{n}, \mathfrak{A} x_{n}, t\right) \geq \lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{\text {KM }}\left(\mathfrak{P} \mathfrak{P} x_{n}, \mathfrak{P} x_{n}, t\right)$ for $t>0$.
Thus, the pair $(\mathfrak{U}, \mathfrak{P})$ is $\mathcal{A}$-intimate.
Since $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{S} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{Q} x_{n}=1$ and $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{S} \mathfrak{Q} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{Q Q} x_{n}=1$
this gives $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(\mathfrak{S} \mathfrak{Q} x_{n}, \mathfrak{S} x_{n}, t\right) \geq \lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(\mathfrak{Q Q} x_{n} \mathfrak{Q} x_{n}, t\right)$.
Thus, the pair $(\mathfrak{S}, \mathfrak{Q})$ is $\mathcal{S}$-intimate. Moreover, it satisfies the contraction condition of the theorem. Clearly 1 is the unique common fixed point for these four mappings.

Finally, we discuss another theorem.
3.3 Theorem: Let $\left(\mathbb{X}, \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}, *\right)$ be a FMS. Suppose $\mathfrak{P}, \mathfrak{Q}, \mathfrak{S}$ and $\mathfrak{A}$ are self maps on $\mathbb{X}$
satisfying the conditions $(\mathcal{C}-2)$ and $(\mathcal{C}-4)$ in addition to
$(\mathcal{C}-6) \mathfrak{U}(\mathbb{X})$ and $\mathfrak{S}(\mathbb{X})$ are closed subsets of $\mathbb{X}$
$(\mathcal{C}-7)$ the pairs $(\mathfrak{P}, \mathfrak{A})$ and $(\mathfrak{Q}, \mathfrak{S})$ share the common property E. A.
Then $\mathfrak{P}, \mathfrak{Q}, \mathfrak{S}$ and $\mathfrak{A}$ have a unique common fixed point in $\mathbb{X}$.
Proof: In view of the condition $(\mathcal{C}-7)$ there exists two sequences $\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle$ and $\left\langle\gamma_{n}\right\rangle$ in $\mathbb{X}$ such that $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{P} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{Q} \gamma_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{S} \gamma_{n}=p *$ for some $p * \in \mathbb{X}$.
From the $(\mathcal{C}-6)$ we have $\mathfrak{H}(\mathbb{X})$ is closed subset of $\mathbb{X}$,consequently $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{P} x_{n}=p * \in$ $\mathfrak{U}(\mathbb{X})$. This means there exists appoint $u \in \mathbb{X}$ such that $\mathfrak{A} u=p *$.
Now we assert that $\mathfrak{B u}=\mathfrak{A} u$.
Put $x=u$ and $\gamma=\gamma_{n}$, we get
$\mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{P u}, \mathfrak{Q} y_{n}, \mathrm{k} t\right)$

& \geq \mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{A u}, \mathfrak{S} y_{n}, t\right) * \mathrm{M}_{K M}(\mathfrak{P u}, \mathfrak{A u}, t) * \mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{Q} y_{n}, \mathfrak{S} y_{n}, t\right) \\
& * \mathrm{M}_{K M}\left(\mathfrak{P u}, \mathfrak{S} y_{n}, t\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

Which on making $n \rightarrow \infty$, with $\mathfrak{A} u=p *$ reduces to $\mathfrak{P u} u=p$. This implies
$\mathfrak{P} u=\mathfrak{A} u=p *$ which signifies that $u$ is coincident point of the pair $(\mathfrak{P}, \mathfrak{A})$.
On the other hand, $\mathfrak{S}(\mathbb{X})$ is closed subset of $\mathbb{X}$ therefore $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{S} \gamma_{n}=p * \in \mathbb{S}(\mathbb{X})$ and hence we can find a point $w \in \mathbb{X} \ni \mathfrak{S} w=p *$.
Now we show that $\mathfrak{S} w=\mathfrak{Q} w$. On using condition $(\mathcal{C}-2)$ with
$x=\mathrm{u}$ and $\gamma=\mathrm{w}$ then we get

$$

\mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}(\mathfrak{P u}, \mathfrak{Q w}, \mathrm{k} t) \geq \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(\mathfrak{A} \mathrm{u}, \mathfrak{S}_{\mathrm{w}}, t\right) * \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}(\mathfrak{P u}, \mathfrak{A} \mathrm{u}, t) * \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(\mathfrak{Q w}, \mathfrak{S}_{\mathrm{w}}, t\right) * \\
\mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(\mathfrak{B u}, \mathfrak{S}_{\mathrm{w}}, t\right) .
\end{gathered}
$$

This implies $\mathfrak{Q w}=\mathrm{p} *$.This gives $\mathfrak{S}_{\mathrm{w}}=\mathfrak{Q w}=\mathrm{p} *$.
Since the pair $(\mathfrak{Q}, \mathfrak{S})$ is $\mathcal{S}$-intimate this gives
$\mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}(\mathrm{S} p *, \mathrm{p} *, t) \geq \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}(\mathfrak{Q} \mathrm{p} *, \mathrm{p} *, t)$.

Suppose that $\mathfrak{S} p * \neq p *$.
Put $x=\mathrm{u}$ and $\gamma=\mathrm{p} *$ in contraction condition $(\mathcal{C}-2)$

$$

\mathrm{M}_{K M}(\mathfrak{P u}, \mathfrak{Q} p & *, \mathrm{k} t) \\
& \geq \mathrm{M}_{K M}(\mathfrak{A u}, \subseteq p *, t) * \mathrm{M}_{K M}(\mathfrak{P u}, \mathfrak{A} \mathrm{u}, t) * \mathrm{M}_{K M}(\mathfrak{Q} p *, \subseteq p *, t) \\
& * \mathrm{M}_{K M}(\mathfrak{P u}, \Im p *, t)
\end{aligned}
$$

implies $\mathfrak{Q p} *=\mathrm{p} *$.
Using $\mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}(\mathrm{Sp} *, \mathrm{p} *, \mathrm{t}) \geq \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}(\mathrm{p} *, \mathrm{p} *, t)$
we get $\mathfrak{S p} *=\mathrm{p} *$.
Therefore $\mathfrak{Q p} *=\mathfrak{S} p *=\mathrm{p} * \ldots \ldots \ldots(\psi-1)$.
Since $\mathfrak{P u}=\mathfrak{A} \mathrm{u}=\mathrm{p} *$ and using $(\mathfrak{P}, \mathfrak{A})$ is $\mathcal{A}$-intimate then we get $\mathfrak{A} \mathrm{p} *=\mathrm{p} *$.
By putting $x=\gamma=\mathrm{p} *$ we get
$\mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}(\mathfrak{P p} *, \mathfrak{Q} \mathrm{p} *, \mathrm{k} t)$
$\geq \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}(\mathfrak{A p} *, \mathfrak{S p} *, t) * \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}(\mathfrak{P} \mathrm{p} *, \mathfrak{2} \mathrm{p} *, t) * \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}(\mathfrak{Q p} *, \mathfrak{S p} *, t)$
$*_{\mathrm{KM}}(\mathfrak{P p} *, \subseteq p *, t)$.
This implies $\mathfrak{P p} *=\mathrm{p} *$ and this gives $\mathfrak{A p} *=\mathfrak{P p} *=\mathrm{p} * \ldots \ldots(\psi-2)$.
From $(\psi-1)$ and $(\psi-2)$ we conclude that $\mathfrak{A p} *=\mathfrak{P p} *=\mathfrak{Q p} *=\mathfrak{S} p *=\mathrm{p} *$.
We can prove the uniqueness of the fixed point easily.
Example 3.3.1: Suppose $\left(\mathbb{X}, \mathrm{M}_{\text {Км, }}, *\right)$ is a standard FMS with $a * a \geq a \forall a \in[1,20]$, where $\mathfrak{A}, \mathfrak{S}, \mathfrak{P}$ and $\mathfrak{Q}: \mathbb{X} \rightarrow \mathbb{X}$ as

\mathfrak{P}(\mathbb{X})=\mathfrak{Q}(\mathbb{X})=\{1\} \cup(1,2), \mathfrak{S}(\mathbb{X})=\{1\} \cup\{12\} \cup[1,5] \text { and } \\
\mathfrak{A}(\mathbb{X})=\{1\} \cup\{7\} \cup[1,9] \text { these sets satisfy the conditions }(\mathcal{C}-1) \text { and }(\mathcal{C}-3) .
\end{gathered}
$$

Now assume $\left\langle x_{n}\right\rangle=\left\{2+\frac{1}{n}\right\}$ and $\left\langle\gamma_{n}\right\rangle=\{1\}$ then
$\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{P} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathcal{S} \gamma_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{Q} \gamma_{n}=1$.
This implies the pairs $(\mathfrak{P}, \mathfrak{A})$ and $(\mathfrak{S}, \mathfrak{Q})$ share the common E. A property and also we have, $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{A} \mathfrak{P} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{P} \mathfrak{P} x_{n}=1$ this gives
$\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(\mathfrak{H P} x_{n}, \mathfrak{U} x_{n}, t\right) \geq \lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(\mathfrak{P} \mathfrak{\beta} x_{n}, \mathfrak{P} x_{n}, t\right)$, for $t>0$.
Thus, the pair $(\mathfrak{A}, \mathfrak{P})$ is $\mathcal{A}$-intimate.
Since $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{S} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{Q} x_{n}=1$ and $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{S} \mathfrak{Q} x_{n}=\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathfrak{Q Q} x_{n}=1$
this gives $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(\mathfrak{S Q} x_{n}, \mathfrak{S} x_{n}, t\right) \geq \lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{KM}}\left(\mathfrak{Q Q} x_{n}, \mathfrak{Q} x_{n}, t\right)$.
Thus, the pair $(\mathfrak{S}, \mathfrak{Q})$ is $\mathcal{S}$-intimate. Moreover, it satisfies the contraction condition of the theorem. Clearly 1 is the unique common fixed point for these four mappings.

## 4 Conclusion

This paper aimed to prove three common fixed point theorems to generalize the class of compatible mappings by using the calss of non compatible mappings like different forms of E.A properties along with intimate mappings in fuzzy metric space. In Theorem 3.1, one of the range of mappings is assumed to be complete.Further, in Theorem 3.2, one of the pairs is assumed to satisfy E.A property along with one of the range of mappings is complete without being complete fuzzy metric space. Finally in Theorem 3.3, improved version of EA property namely common EA property is assumed along with completeness of fuzzy metric space. Moreover, all these results are justified with suitable examples.
